'Real-life reading'- coffee shop: Today, you'll set up a pretend 'coffee shop' using items from around the home. You will write down several different 'order forms' for your child to read and they will make the relevant coffees and cakes. It may help to make some playdough to be used as 'cakes' for this activity, if possible. Please login to Seesaw in the morning to see the order forms as they can be written out at home.	As we are focussing on rhyme this week, let's have a go at writing some words to making a matching pairs rhyming game. Can your child think of and write down a word that rhymes with: box, mop, big, kick, rat, fish, tip, mend, fix, crack (set them more if your child is enjoying this/needs a challenge of set 2 sounds e.g. feed, book etc!) Ask them to write the words I have given, along with the rhyming words they thought of, down on separate little squares of paper or card. This can then become a matching game. 'Real-life reading'- Which animal am I thinking of- clues: Today you'll play a guessing game using handwritten clues to discover 4 different animals- the children need to read the clues to guess which is which. As with last week, you will draw and label your guesses, post them on Seesaw and I will reply letting you know if you got them right.	This morning you read clues to find out which animals I was thinking of. Now, you will be the one writing the clues and I will be guessing! Choose your favourite animal. Think about 2 or 3 clues you could give me to help me guess the one you are thinking of. Now, write those clues down in sentences. Use your sound mat and red word cards to help you. Remember your finger spaces between words and full stop at the end of each clue. Post your clues on Seesaw and I will guess!	
Friday	Today on your daily walk or exercise, can you look for shapes? As you are spotting them, discuss how many sides and how many corners these shapes have. When you get home, can your child remember one object for each shape they spotted? For real life reading today, please select a phonics lesson book or phonics home reader from your learning pack. Even if you have read this book before, re-reading is a valuable activity as it develops fluency and confidence. It's a good opportunity to keep them familiarised with the format of reading they will encounter when they return to school. Discuss the questions at the end of the book together. You say the word of something in your soup. E.g. <i>In my silly soup I have a bug</i> (draw, label and cut out a bug and put it in the bowl). Your partner needs to think of something that rhymes with 'bug' and say it. E.g. <i>In my silly soup I have a mug</i> (they draw, label and cut out a mug and put it in the bowl.) How many silly rhyming ingredients to make your soup can you think of together?
