In Nursery and Reception, children learned about the PANTS rules. We recommend regularly reviewing these rules with your child to ensure they are confident remembering all of them.

Positive Mental Health and

Wellbeing

It was World Mental Health Awareness day on Monday 10th October. Dr Natalie, our WAMHs clinician shared an assembly with us on our current wellbeing theme: *Belonging to My Community*. The assembly focused on children celebrating their own uniqueness and their individual identity and a reflection on how each of us benefits from and contributes to our diverse community.

The five 'Ways to Wellbeing' were also shared again with our children.

We have also shared the UNICEF *Outright* Campaign with our children in assemblies to empower them with strategies to prioritise their positive health and wellbeing. As we further explore this campaign, our children will use their voices to share their ideas and strategies more widely.

Next half-term, you will have a chance to meet Dr Natalie Bailey at a families workshop. She will share strategies to support your wellbeing during times of challenge. She will signpost support linked to the cost of living crisis and provide a safe and supportive space for you to share how you are feeling.

Trips and Learning



Willow has been learning about sculpture this term, exploring the works of Anish Kapoor and Barbara Hepworth. We have built on our prior knowledge of sculpture, using this knowledge to create a 3D bird sculpture. We have used the medium of papier-mâché, investigating the size of the newspaper, different paper types and the perfect consistency of the glue. After carefully observing similar sculptures, we sketched our final design. With our final design in mind we used our papier-mâché skills and covered a balloon so that this resembled the bird's body. Once that dried we painted our birds and attached appendages such as the beak and wings. To further enrich Willow's learning of sculptures we visited Anish Kapoor's ArcelorMittal Orbit in Stratford. We got the chance to see his sculpture and have a close look at the materials that were used. Willow also got to experience travelling down the slide!



Birch Class took a trip to the City of London to visit St Paul's Cathedral. In history lessons, Birch class learned that the Great Fire of London destroyed the Cathedral in 1666. We were able to go and find some statues that had been partly destroyed in the fire. They are over 350 years old! We were lucky enough to get to dress up in 17th Century clothing and find out how hard it would have been to put out such an enormous fire using only leather buckets! We learnt all about the famous architect, Sir Christopher Wren, who designed St Paul's Cathedral and most of London after the fire. We observed models of St Pauls before and after the fire and we noticed that before, it had a spire, and after it had a dome. Our favourite part was lying under the huge dome, which was Wren's masterpiece!





Some of the things we discussed were:


-how can parents, carers and educators talk to children about systemic racism in a way that is appropriate and accessible to children at different developmental stages?



We heard about the achievements and contributions of black individuals from different periods and places.

We have ensured that black history is an integral part of our units, from the Romans, Tudors, Victorians and WWII using high-quality resources from Hackney Museum. Our units on the Victorians and Ancient Benin explore colonialism and the British Empire from a diverse range of perspectives.
