Communication

Thank you for sharing your views in our parents and carers communication survey this half-term.

Please do take the time to read through the **half termly curriculum letter** your child's class teacher has shared this week. It is an opportunity to find out what your child will be learning next half term, and to inspire them about the challenges in store. Curriculum Visions is a great place to go if your child is eager to do some research over the half term. It is an online portal which gives children access to a wide range of e-books about science, history, geography, RE and many more subjects.

Commitment of the half term

The Commitment we are focusing on next half term is **Learn Together**. We will be thinking carefully about how we collaborate in partnership. This Commitment is closely linked to our focus on oracy. When we learn together, we listen carefully to the views of others, as well as expressing our own.

he PSHE focus next half term is *Relationships*. We will focus on family relationships as well as friendships, and learn how to appreciate the bonds we have, resolve conflict, communicate responsibly and effectively and navigate trust and boundaries within relationships.

On Tuesday 18th April at 9am there is an information session about RSHE (Relationships, Sex and Health Education) as part of our PSHE curriculum (Personal, Social and Health Education). We will share details of the learning in this subject and explain how the Jigsaw PSHE curriculum addresses learning about the LGBTQ+ community. As a proudly Rights Respecting school, we ensure that all learning is rooted in our inclusive and anti-discriminatory approach in an accessible and age-appropriate way.

E-Safety

We receive and share regular updates from the iNEQE Safeguarding group. You can access their most current content here: https://ineqe.com/online-safety/ We all play a vital role in ensuring children are safe online. This includes when they are accessing any digital device such as a laptop, tablet, desktop, smart phone, smart watch or an internet-enabled TV. It also relates to times away from home (e.g. time staying with friends or family). Talking to children about staying safe online and always supervising their activity online are to hugely important ways of ensuring all children stay safe given the range of dangers online. Supervision online is an essential safeguard to protect children.

To Celebrate

Thank you to our governor, Frances-Peel Yates, and the team at Arnold House school for an overwhelmingly generous donation of over a thousand books this half term. Our children were so excited when they were delivered and have already started to enjoy them in the past few weeks. Some of these donations are now stocked in our Book Hut and others are in our main library and class libraries.

World Book Day was a joyful celebration this half term. Children enjoyed reading outside and with children across different year groups as part of this very special day. We celebrated a diverse range of characters in our reading curriculum.



Attendance

As part of our approach to promoting and celebrating positive attendance, we are sharing the class averages this half term. The arrows indicate the trend in attendance in each class. We are concerned that rates are continuing to drop across many of our classes.

Acorns (N): 87.8%↓
Cherries (R): 92.1%↑
Chestnuts (Y1): 95.2%↑
Birch (Y2): 97.2 %↑
Holly (Y3): 92%↓
Willow:(Y4): 94.7%↓
Elm (Y5): 91.2%↓
Oak (Y6): 92%↓

We will advise parents of a child's overall attendance levels at least once a year. This will usually include a percentage attendance figure. Achieving 90% in an exam or test is a fantastic result but if your child is at school for only 90% of the school year then they will have missed 19 days - almost four whole weeks of school. For primary-age children, this can mean almost 120 guided learning hours. This is a big gap for any child to make up. The expected level of attendance for Hackney school children is at least 95%. Our school target for attendance is 96.5%.

Being punctual is as important as good attendance. Our soft start means that pupils need to arrive on time between **8:45-8:55am** and unless they attend clubs, be collected promptly at **3:30pm**. Any children arriving after 8:55am, or picked up after 3:30pm will be given a late warning. Arriving late can be a negative experience for children and affect their wellbeing.

School Uniform

Our school policy is that all children should wear a school uniform. The basis of our approach is that wearing our Springfield uniform underpins a sense of belonging to our school and a feeling of pride. We have thought carefully about a uniform which is practical and smart, is not distracting for children, engenders a sense of equity amongst children and is affordable.

We have the following expectations for uniform across phases: Uniform: grey trousers, skirt or pinafore, a checked green dress in summer, a green school sweatshirt and a white polo shirt. Black school shoes (not trainers or branded shoes) - please avoid shoes with laces if they are not yet able to tie shoelaces themselves.

PE kit: green shorts or grey/black tracksuit bottoms, a white t-shirt, a green school jumper and trainers (appropriate for physical activity not a fashion item) or plimsolls.

Survey Results

In our recent families survey, 100% of families who responded said they would recommend Springfield to another family. We are so proud that this is how we feel as a community. Thank you all for the part you play in making Springfield a place we would encourage and welcome any child to be.





Trips

Class: Year 4 Willow Class visit to East London Mosque

Recently in Willow class, we have been learning about why the Qur'an is important to Muslims. To enrich our learning, we visited the East London Mosque, where we learnt that it is the biggest mosque in Western Europe. We were given a tour of the main prayer room while setting our sights on the vast dome that had beautiful Arabic scriptures above us. We were very lucky to be able to experience the call to prayer (Athan) coming from the minaret while we were eating lunch and experiencing the ritual washing (wudu) routine in the designated room.



Year 2 Birch visit to London Zoo

This term, Birch went to London Zoo to explore how different animals from around the world need different habitats. We were struck by how hot the habitat of the giant tortoises was! We found out that they come from the Galapagos Islands which are on the Equator, so their natural habitat would have been very hot!

We reflected on how animals such as tigers and gorillas need large habitats to run, climb and hide. We saw habitats from Africa, Asia, South America and even microhabitats like those in our very own houses and gardens!

It was a long day of being zoologists but we had the best time and made memories to last!

Reception's First School Trip! A fieldwork walk to explore our local area.

We were so excited to go on an interesting and inspiring Community Walk and trip to the Stamford Hill Library. We walked passed places in our community that we have been learning about, such as the Synagogue and Greek Orthodox Church.
